1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Institution is affiliated to Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University, Chennai and the University plans and prepares the curriculum by considering the psychological and sociological needs of the prospective teachers. Institution implements it in the best way to bring out the expected outcomes. At the beginning of the academic year, head of the institution organizes a meeting to assign the courses to all the educators to equalize the working hours and seeks suggestions to make the teaching and learning process more effective. Instructional materials that are needed for the effective implementation of the curriculum are carefully chosen and the facilities which are needed for execution are provided and monitored by the institution. In the orientation class organized at the beginning of the academic year, the students are oriented on the programme outcomes and course outcomes to promote better understanding of the curriculum. Time tables are scheduled flexibly to furnish equal importance to both theory and practical. To boost up the teaching and learning process ICT tools and printed material supports are provided to the educators. To benefit the students and educators reference books related to the courses are accumulated in the library. Both the traditional and advanced methods of teaching and learning, such as chalk and talk, ICT tools, paper presentation, seminar, group discussions and field trips are employed by the educators. At frequent intervals student involvement in the curriculum is assessed and remedial trainings are offered. Additional supports needed for the curriculum enhancement are also given by the institution. Peer group discussion and students performance in the internal examinations are the source of identifying the needs for further improvement. Having all these things in mind the institution appreciates and implements the curriculum with utmost care.

Feedback Obtained

Institution has the feedback system to weed out the undesired practices and to promote the desired proceedings for the welfare of students, educators, society and institution. Every year the institution receives feedback from students, teachers, employers, alumni and parents. Forms which contain subjective and objective type questions are given to them and their responses are recorded for the development of the institution. Students give feedback on teachers' performance, teaching methods, learning facilities available in the institution, internal evaluation procedures, cleanliness of the campus, internet facilities, field trips, and internship, library and laboratory usages. Teachers' feedback comprises feedback on curriculum, availability of teaching and learning facilities, course and time allocation, cleanliness, ICT tools, internet consumption, library and laboratory maintenance, students' performance in curricular and co-curricular activities. They also record their valuable suggestions for the further enhancement of the institution. SWOT analysis helps them to identify the areas where improvements are needed. Alumni feedback reflects on the areas which are as to be prioritized in the competitive world for student development. By comparing the institution with others alumni give suitable appreciations and suggestions with love and care for the future development as they take part in the nurturing growth of the institution which had molded them. Their feedback is analyzed and remedial efforts are taken to maintain the standards of the institution. Employers who assist the students for internship also give feedback regarding students' performance in the internship period, their teaching skills, their quality and how they behaved in their schools. Based on this the institution takes efforts to bring about constructive changes. Parents provide feedback with regard to their children's academic performance, infrastructure and facilities available in the institution. They also report the conveniences and inconveniences experienced which are shared by their children at home. Their proposals are considered and reforms are taken. Institution takes initiatives on the basis of the feedback received from various sectors to assure quality in all its initiatives.

Based on the student enrollment, mentor: mentee ratio is formed and initiated at the beginning of the academic year. It is hard to give special attention to each individual in a large group. Mentoring system provides a way to each mentor to understand the needs of the limited number of students which means the needs of their mentees. Mentors meet their mentees at regular intervals. They provide guidance and counseling to their mentees both in their academic and non-academic areas. Mentor also acts as a powerful medium to carry information to the students regarding the reforms that the institution wants to undertake for the welfare of the students. Each mentor has mentees from different programmes such as B. Ed., M.Ed., and M.Phil. It makes students to get familiar with their seniors and juniors and also creates a great bond between them. Interactions in the mentors. During mentor meet, performances of the mentees in the internal examination are enquired and the remedial measures for further improvement are suggested by the mentors. Even mentor has the privilege of meeting the parents of the mentees to discuss about the matters which are needed for the wellbeing of their mentees. After the meet, mentors discuss common needs that are conveyed by their mentees with their colleagues. 2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Concerted efforts of the teacher educators and school mentors are helpful to improve the teaching competency of the trainees. Other aspects of the students' performance- their participation in extracurricular activities, extension programmes, leadership abilities and values are assessed continuously. Internal evaluations are conducted by the institution at regular intervals. To assess and evaluate the students learning CIE is implemented. Internal examination timetable is mentioned in the college calendar, and the students are informed about them by placing the timetable on the notice board, a week before the internals. It gives them an opportunity to analyze their understanding level of the course contents. Students are assigned to write an exam in the forenoon and are given permission to study for the next exam in the afternoon. Internal evaluations are done by the educators of the institution and the students are given suggestions about their performance. One who writes well are appreciated and the one who needs more care are identified to take remedial measures. Scores gained by the students in internals are informed to their parents through post. Students who got less than pass mark are advised to rewrite the exams in order to help them in the preparation for the final exams. Educators do internal evaluation without any bias. Writing internals at regular intervals help students to stay away from the exam anxiety and it also give them a practice to complete the exam in an allotted time. Exams not only helps students to understand their learning but also helps teachers to get feedback of their teaching and helps them to take additional efforts to bring a better learning outcome. The teaching competencies of the students are assessed through multimodes. Utmost care is paid to improve the teaching skills of the students.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Academic calendar is prepared at the beginning of the academic year by having

university calendar as its base. Columns in the calendar are date, day, working day number, B.Ed schedule and M.Ed Schedule. It starts form the commencing date of the II B. Ed and M. Ed programme. National and state holidays and the programmes organized by the clubs, student council are decided to celebrate are mentioned in the academic calendar. Days related to school internship, internal examination and innovative school visit are also presented in the academic calendar to inform both the students and teachers about the time availability and to avoid last minute work. It serves as a guide and a reminder to carry out all the planned events in its right time. Special days related to college, such as college day, intercollegiate competitions, alumni meet, sports day are also mentioned in the academic calendar. It also has a list of events that teachers plan for the academic year. As it mentions all the programmes of the college, it stands like a road map which helps to reach our destination at the expected time through careful preparation.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 - Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice - 1 Short Film Making Short films can be a powerful tool to get messages across to the student population. With increasingly available technology free of cost for editing, short films can be used in classrooms to provide lessons on social themes. Many short films are used in the college to support the delivery of content and this has been received well by the students. Given this context, the teachers felt the need to produce short films to support learning. With the help of already available physical resources, the creative potentials of the students were harnessed to produce short films. Short films have been made on significant issues like anti-corruption, gender discrimination, consumer awareness and environmental protection. These short films can serve to bring the needed attitudinal changes in the society. The objectives of the practice are: 1. To enrich the students creativity 2. To display the reality and to give a chance of reshaping the reality by innovative practices 3. To bring out the innate capability of the students 4. To help students to become more self-reliant and cooperative 5. To develop cardinal relationships among students Our students are oriented on making short films and they are trained in handling digital and video cameras. Our student teachers also write scripts and encourage students to be involved as a group in making short films. They have classes regularly and are also get support and guidance from the educators. Facilities and equipments needed for the powerful capturing of the events are provided by the institution. Time allotments for short film making are also provided and students are accompanied by our educators to shoot the film in suitable locations. It develops oneness and creates cooperation among them. Editing supports are also provided to achieve perfection in their soulful attempts in short film making. The short films made by our students are screened during the annual day celebration every year. Students are also motivated to take part in short film making contests and win prizes. They come with already formulated knowledge, ideas, and understandings to the classroom. This previous knowledge is the raw material for the new knowledge they will create. Teachers must prioritize and

adopt methods which favour students and encourage them to learn. They must not rely on outdated strategies and focus on providing a holistic approach towards various topics. Hence the institution strives to adopt constructivist pedagogical practices in teaching learning. The teaching faculty incorporates different techniques of teaching by which the students are made to draw connections between concepts and analyze complex issues. The objectives of the practice are: 1. To create dynamic and motivated learners 2. To create active engaging learning situations 3. To create a context in which learners will integrate new knowledge with the existing knowledge 4. To enable the faculty to adopt innovative instructional strategies 5. To enable the learners to develop higher order thinking skills Teachers of the institution adopt constructivist learning approaches in their classrooms to create meaningful learning experiences. Students are made to construct their own knowledge through a hub of teaching learning activities. Student reevaluates and readjusts his knowledge and understanding through the learning experiences provided. Our teachers use novel ways to help learners to take ownership of their learning. The college being tech savvy, the teachers also integrate technology in teaching learning to provide for constructivism. Some of the constructivist methods used are: Mask exercise, Amoeba Triangle, Construction of Egogram, Flipped Classroom, Blogs, Google Classroom The traditional chalk talk method is an easy way of teaching and most teachers are of the idea that teaching is imparting instruction rather than knowledge construction. There was an initial inertia among teachers to adopt the new practicse in their regular stream way of teaching. These were the challenges faced in bringing into practice the strategy. This was overcome by motivating the teachers and creating awareness among teachers regarding constructivism through faculty development programmes. Measures were also taken to encourage faculty to integrate technology and facilitate the use of constructivist approaches through demonstrations. The student were encouraged to become autonomous learners. It has contributed to the professional development of teachers by trying out new pedagogical practices. Different learner-centered practices have come into existence in the college ensuring joyful learning experiences.
